- 3. The external evaluation for each paper, except NUES papers, shall be based on end-term theory examinations each paper carrying 60 marks.
- 4. Minimum credits required for the successful completion of PhD Course Work shall be 12 credits.
- 5. It is mandatory to take the course on Review Writing for all PhD research scholars.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR PAPER SETTING (END SEMESTER EXAMINATION)

Unless otherwise specified, the examiner shall abide by the following:

- 1. End Semester Theory papers shall be set only from first three units, i.e., Unit I, II & III only of the respective course content. Unit IV is strictly for the purpose of internal assessment and no question from theory paper shall be set from this Unit.
- 2. There shall be four questions in all, with internal choice. The student shall be required to attempt all the four questions. Each question shall carry 15 marks.
- 3. All questions shall be essay type questions, with internal choice, covering all units of the course content.
- 4. Question Number four would also be essay type question with internal choice. It would cover all the three units and would test the comprehensive/comparative understanding of the texts/thinkers/philosophers in a particular course.
- 5. The Question Papers must be set so as to achieve the objectives laid down for the course.
